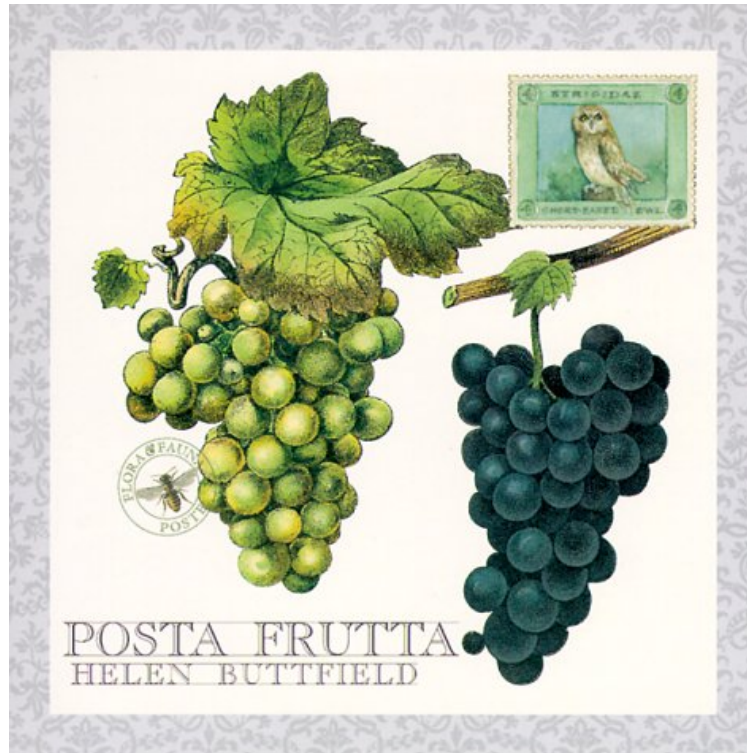

The cards are thick, easy to write on, SQUARE (means extra postage in the USA) and pretty. Fun oversized square cards By Ella Kwint I'm a Postcrosser and am always on the lookout for fun sets. Recently I've seen a lot of requests for oversized or unusual shaped cards. When I spied these, I hoped they fit the bill. On arrival, they didn't disappoint. I wasn't previously familiar with Buttfield's art, but now consider myself a fan. Most of the other postcard sets from Ms. Buttfield are either no longer in print or difficult to find in the US, so even if you're not a particular fan of fruit as a topic, purchasing this offering from her square series, while you still can, is a smart idea. From figs to pears to sumptuous apples, each beautifully painted fruit is accompanied by a whimsical faux postage stamp. Such a lovely touch. However, speaking of real postage, to mail these within the US, you'll need to apply a Non-Machinable Surcharge stamp or the equivalent rate. (I assume these weren't published for our market as the card says only Letter

Rate postage is required.)A very wordy blurb, though not necessarily unappreciated/quite informative, about each fruit is printed on the upper left side. As these are oversized, youll still have plenty of room for your message. However, the preprinted line separating the address field from the message side leaves you very, very little space for the address. Many international addresses are far too bulky to fit in this narrow field so Ill have to use a label. Its a piddly complaint but just a little odd as youd think a 6x6 card would provide oodles of room for an address.The card stock is decently thick and the message side is an ink-friendly matte. The cards are bound but VERY easy to remove no annoying glue residue or rips resulted. A nice value for the money and with two of each fruit, you can keep one and send the other.

For Posta Frutta, Helen Buttfeld has gathered a beautiful selection of historical botanical prints of fruits. From apples to guava, she combines these engravings with a new collection of her hand-painted stamps. Each stamp is drawn specifically to complement the engraving and feature a range of beneficial subjects.
